
Arts and Culture for Peace Initiative 2023



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Arts and Culture for Peace Initiative

UK ASPnet, supported by Japan's National ASPnet Coordinator, is leading this new Initiative, which is inspired by the UK-Japan Between the Stones project and pilot projects by five Coventry schools.

The Initiative was officially launched at the International Virtual 'Connecting for Peace' UNESCO ASPnet U.K. Conference on 17 June 2022.

The UNESCO ASPnet Arts & Culture for Peace Initiative focuses on three important ASPnet Action Areas related to 'peace', 'sustainability' and 'intercultural learning and heritage'.

The aim is for young people around the world to work on the following 'transformative' arts & culture for peace activities:

- E-forest for Peace Create artistically dynamic peace trees (real or imagined) with peace poems and images to highlight the importance of living in peace with ourselves, our communities, and our planet.
- Performing Arts for Peace Develop and perform stories, plays and songs that reflect our global citizenship, cultural diversity and the challenges of ensuring a more peaceful world through the transformative efforts of students.
- Gardens for Peace Use ideas and designs for peace gardens to support the well-being of others, as well as to convey the critical and urgent importance of living more peacefully and sustainably with nature, ourselves and our planet.

Schools may work on one, two, or all three activities – or any combination of these.

They are also asked to use a 'less is more' minimal creative and

intellectual approach across diverse cultural forms, which will also reflect the spirit of sustainability in completing this activity. Schools may work with artists and other partners.

The results of these activities should aim to benefit both local and global communities in relation to the three ASPnet Action Areas.

Journey to Kyoto, Japan

Following the launch of the Arts and Peace for Culture Initiative the U.K ASPnet coordinator and the ASPnet International Coordinator Paris led on bringing together ASPnet National Coordinators globally to develop a programme in collaboration with Doshisha University in Kyoto, Japan during the 70th anniversary year of ASPnet.

During the many months of planning the programme changed many times and many of our colleagues from the steering committee were not able to commit to join us in Japan, but they will be in our hearts as we share cultural learning together in Kyoto.

The countries participating are Japan, South Korea, The Gambia, Oman, Netherlands, Belgium, Poland, Singapore and the U.K.

About the Program

Doshisha University's Liferisk Research Centre, in liaison with UNESCO Associated Schools Network (ASPnet) UK, the U.K. National Commission for UNESCO will jointly organise a 5-day cultural exchange with learners and educators. In cooperation with Kyoto University of Foreign Studies and supported by Kyoto UNESCO Association, Kobe University's Centre for Computational Social Science, and International Society for Education and Tamagawa University (Teacher Education Institute of ASPnet).

Schools will be working on the Arts and Culture for Peace initiative U.K. in Kyoto, Japan known for traditional Japanese culture and promoting sustainability.

The exchange aims to provide intercultural experiences among the participants to discuss the challenges to achieve a Culture of Peace. This will be enlightened by the global peace-relay, through a hybrid tea ceremony hosted by UNESCO Goodwill Ambassador Dr Genshitsu Sen at the Opening Ceremony, to connect with ASPnet students who share their own tea cultures from all regions.

The 5-day programme is set out within the framework of the key theme of the ASPnet 70th anniversary celebration "Fostering a Culture of Peace and Sustainable Development through Transformative Education."

The programme invites approximately 70 participants, students of age 11 to 16 accompanied by teachers, and National Coordinators, from 9 countries (ensuring gender and regional balance) including students and teachers from Japan.

The outcome of this event will be showcased at the exhibition to celebrate the ASPnet 70th anniversary during the General Conference in November 2023.

Students will:

- Learn about peace initiatives from communities around the world and consider how they can implement what they have learnt in their own communities.
- Learn to work collaboratively and peacefully in an international setting, developing tolerance and understanding.

- Learn about the difference between peacekeeping and peacemaking.
- Learn about delivering sustainable development and sustainable lifestyles.
- Learn about cultures and traditions and appreciating cultural diversity and heritage.
- Learn how to use creative arts to tell their story through theatre, art, sound, music, poetry and ceramics; to create impactful displays to be showcased at the UNESCO General Conference and other sites.

Gift a Poem

Arts and Culture for Peace Initiative (U.K.) and Gift a Poem (Poland) invite you to participate in this collaboration in Kyoto to celebrate the 70th Anniversary of UNESCO ASPnet.

The UNESCO ASPnet Arts & Culture for Peace Initiative focuses on three important ASPnet Action Areas related to 'peace', 'sustainability' and 'intercultural learning and heritage'. We believe that through the collaboration with the Gift a Poem programme this encapsulates these areas through creating peace trees with peace poems and images to highlight the importance of living in peace with ourselves, our communities, and our planet.

The Zbigniew Herbert Foundations mission is to preserve and disseminate the creative legacy of Zbigniew Herbert, one of the greatest poets of the 20th century as well as to promote reading among a wider audience of people. They do this through an educational and social campaign 'Gift a Poem'.

The 'Gift a Poem' campaign became part of ASPnet's 70th anniversary celebrations and was carried out on World Poetry Day on March 21, 2023 in 14 countries. On the campaign's website (www.giftapoem.pl) you will find detailed information on this initiative.

The Activity:

We invite all participants of the meeting in Kyoto to bring handwritten poems - messages of peace - for their colleagues from other countries taking part in the event.

We invite you and your students to join us in 4 simple steps:

- 1. Choose a book of poetry at home or at school.
- 2. Select a poem.
- 3. Copy the chosen poem by hand onto a stationary card*. If you choose a poem in your mother tongue, please copy a translation of the poem into English on the back.
- 4. Bring the poem to Kyoto with you to hang on the peace tree at the opening ceremony and share with others at the closing ceremony.
- * The stationary card is A4 size, 120 gsm weight. Then cut it, punch a hole at the top and thread it with a ribbon to hang on the peace tree, like traditional Japanese Tanzaku Peace Poems. The poems should be handwritten with the monogram of "Gift a Poem", and please write your name, school address and school email on the back of the card.


Zbigniew Herbert wrote poems and letters to friends and artists who were important to him, to people he valued and some of these letters were later included in the poets' books and are among his most insightful and moving works. This writer's gesture of giving someone a handwritten poem is what inspires this initiative.

We believe that the act of offering someone words of poetry is a thoroughly human one. Potentially a form of friendly presence and spiritual support. A means of sustaining hope. That is why we encourage you to participate in this initiative and join the collaboration with the Arts and Culture for peace Initiative.

The organised 'Gift a Poem' initiative joined with the 'Arts and Culture for Peace Initiative' could become a lesson in compassion as well as an opportunity to build friendships in Kyoto and consider how to ensure

peace and sustainability in our communities for future generations; through the sharing of our cultural heritage.

Oxford University Kilns

Oxford University Kilns is a Japanese-inspired research project founded in 2014, by Dr Robin Wilson of the Deprtment of Anthropology in Oxford. It is based at the research woodlands of the University of Oxford, known as Wytham Woods. We currently have four wood-fired ceramics kilns, two of which are single-chambered anagama style kilns, one of which was built by the Bizen kiln-builder and ceramic artist Takuma Takikawa.

Taku-san visited the University as Resident Artist on several occasions between 2015 and 2017 with the support of the Daiwa Foundation. Other Japanese potters have always been involved with the project, which counted as its first Patron the Living National Treasure of Bizen, Isezaki Jun, who visited Oxford in 2015 with a delegation from Bizen for the inauguration of our first anagama kiln firing.

The purpose of the project is to introduce and inspire new and established potters in the art and craft of woodfired ceramics. We work with established fine artists and master craftsmen from Britain, Japan and around the world, as well as having a formal outreach programme of teaching and learning in Japanese-inspired woodfiring that draws in a network of art institutions, museums, community potteries and individuals.

As well as taking Oxford's students from archaeology, anthropology, fine art and museum studies, we work with postgraduates from the Royal College of Art, the University of Art, London, Clay College, Goldsmiths University, Falmouth Art School, and many others.

We have outreach programmes, mentoring and work experience with schools of all age groups.

We have exhibitions of work at Oxford's Ashmolean Museum and Pitt Rivers Museum, and pursue a range of academic publications, public lectures, and regular workshops. Potters working at the kilns exhibit and sell their work in galleries and venues globally. Research is undertaken under the direction of Dr Robin Wilson that includes the technical aspects of kiln-firing as well as the social and cultural dimensions of craft activity in the wider economic community.

The practical aim of the project is to provide a longterm, financially sustainable model for craftspeople using traditional and hybrid technologies in their practice, and to locate this within a framework of university research and a network of support that proactivity enables craft to be pursued in a culturally engaging, socially inclusive and financially viable manner.

One Cup

In learning about the collaboration between Bizen Pottery and Oxford University Anagama kilns and learning from the Grand Tea Master Dr Genshitsu Sen we have developed the concept of 'One Cup'.

Through the sharing of one cup of tea (as is traditional in Japanese tea ceremonies) we will have the opportunity to reflect on the sharing of sustenance and ensuring that all children have equal access to food and resources. This will enable us to gain an understanding of social and environmental responsibility and the part that they play in peacemaking both in their own communities and globally.

There will be workshops, discussions and cultural activities over the five days, working on the theme of 'One Cup' will result in an exhibition highlighting young people's call for a more equal and peaceful world where there is cooperation and sharing of resources. We believe working together, young people will develop a better understanding of different cultures which will promote tolerance and unity.


